


# A rough guide to homelessness policy and legislation

A whistlestop course giving you an introduction and insight into both the history and current direction of homelessness and legislation policy across Scotland. Scotland has world-leading homelessness policy and legislation... so why do we still have homelessness? What policies haven't worked, and which need to be implemented more rapidly and on a bigger scale?

The popular Rough Guide takes you through a timeline of the key legislation and policy to prevent and alleviate homelessness in Scotland since devolution in 1999. And explores the new directions prioritised in the current Ending Homelessness Together plan, and plots what needs to happen next.

#### By the end of the course, you will be able to:

- · Identify homelessness trends across Scotland
- Recognise the inequalities and who is most at risk of experiencing homelessness
- Explain the timeline and policy framework for ending homelessness across Scotland
- Analyse the main policy and planning structures for tackling homelessness
- Share the four new directions for ending homelessness

#### Useful for

This training is designed for staff and volunteer inductions. It is perfect for frontline and admin staff, board members, local authority housing or neighbourhood teams, housing association teams and wider policy roles in antipoverty and equality organisations. The training also provides a useful refresher for staff returning to the sector, covering the policy landscape from 2000 onwards. For the wider public who are interested, it gives context and background to the recent Scottish Government declaration of a Housing Emergency.

# Homelessness prevention: what you can do in your community?

A half-day course giving you the knowledge and tools you need to design a joined-up approach to preventing homelessness in your community. From Dundee to Dunoon, Dingwall to Dumfries, Dunfermline to Duddingston, there will be a different set of challenges and systems to navigate for people experiencing homelessness.

A place-based approach to prevention asks us to find existing community assets and work together to improve wellbeing, address poverty and prevent homelessness – closer to home. Our interactive online course includes practical case studies and is facilitated by our friendly and engaging team who have deep expertise and direct experience of the topic.

#### By the end of the course, you will be able to:

- Identify the evidence about what causes and reduces the risk of homelessness
- Explain why a place-based approach to preventing homelessness is important
- Recognise examples of good practice where interventions are preventing homelessness
- Explore different ways of finding community assets in your location to help protect people's homes
- Analyse your local landscape and who can prevent homelessness closer to home



## The unequal risk:

an equality and human rights lens in housing and homelessness

A half-day course giving you an awareness of entrenched inequalities and practical actions we can take to design a more accessible, inclusive and equitable approach to ending homelessness in Scotland.

We are not all at equal risk of homelessness. Every individual will experience a unique set of circumstances, carry with them their own previous experiences and face different barriers in their journey to a new home. Some groups of people are systematically disadvantaged in the housing system. In Scotland we have a legal framework that includes the Equality Act (2010) and the Scotland Specific Duties, which mean that local authorities and services providers must assess the impacts of strategies and services. Yet we know that inequalities persist.

Join us for this reflective course to think through how we can better listen to and represent diverse communities who experience homelessness. We will introduce you to the evidence in Scotland, underpinning legislation and some practical tools to create better homelessness services.

#### By the end of the course, you will be able to:


- Recognise the systemic inequalities and who is most at risk of experiencing homelessness
- Explore the relevant legal duties within the Equality Act (2010) to homelessness service providers and employers
- Analyse the barriers to equality present in homelessness services and design processes
- Make decisions with an equality lens to ensure that prevention work represents the diverse communities of people affected by housing insecurity
- Reflect on what you need to continue to learn about to be proactive about inequality

#### Useful for

This course is designed for organisations like local councils, registered social landlords and public service providing partners who need to comply with the Equality Act (2010) and the Scotland Specific Duties. It is particularly relevant for equality leads, monitoring teams, senior managers and board members with a governance role.

# Taking a strengths-based approach: superpower your homelessness service

A practical course giving you the knowledge and inspiration you need to create strengths—based systems and relationships with people experiencing homelessness.

Strengths based practice is about meeting people where they are and avoiding deficit models that reinforce negativity and increase barriers to accessing services.

Designing services, facilitating meetings, giving feedback and providing support to people can all be done in subtle ways that build people's confidence and capabilities.

This interactive course will share examples of how we can channel strengths-based language and approaches, to help superpower positive outcomes for the people we work with.

#### By the end of the course, you will be able to

- Identify good practice in strengths-based approaches at an individual, group and organisational level
- Explain why a strengths-based approach is important
- Use a strengths-based approach in your day-to-day work

# **Trauma-informed approaches:** beyond buzzwords to better outcomes

A practical course giving you the tools and tips you need to create trauma–informed services, teams and relationships with people experiencing homelessness.

Trauma informed approaches are crucial because there are links between childhood experiences of trauma and experiencing multiple or complex traumas and homelessness. We cannot know what each individual will find traumatic or retraumatising when we start to engage with them, but we can build relationships, processes and systems that are mindful of this.

We know that people have disproportionately experienced trauma whilst navigating the immigration system, during pandemics, and whilst journeying through the homelessness process itself. We often hear stories of intergenerational trauma, due to entrenched inequality and the frustration that workers voice when the system has not changed and cycles repeat themselves.

How can we bring about more positive change? What does designing and implementing a trauma-informed way of working actually mean?

#### By the end of the course, you will be able to:

- Identify the impact of trauma across an organisation
- Explain the importance of an asset-based approach to trauma
- Share good practice in trauma-informed approaches for workers and people using your services

## Homelessness stigma: a conversation

A half- day course giving you the skills and confidence you need to challenge the pervasive stigma around homelessness.

#### By the end of the course, you will be able to:

- Identify stereotypes in representations of homelessness (images and words)
- Reduce stigma playing your role and positive framing
- Identify barriers for people accessing services including stigma
- Reflect on the power dynamics in your own role and work

This training is designed for people involved in homelessness strategy and service delivery. It is particularly useful for frontline workers, communications and digital teams. It will also be relevant for community food organisations, journalists and organisations that interact with people experiencing housing insecurity and homelessness.

# Good practice in participation and coproduction: working with people experiencing homelessness


#### Useful for

#### Are you new to working in the homelessness sector?

We know it can be a stressful time as you learn new IT systems, decode abundant sector jargon and meet lots of new people (and try to remember their names!). We have created a learning pathway with you in mind. To build your confidence and your connections across the sector in Scotland. Because we know that the one thing frontline workers and managers value beyond the outcomes for the people they work with, is a sense of solidarity, that we are not in this job alone and that people share our challenges.

This five-part training package combines the knowledge and skills you need to work in a person-centred way. It also covers the basic elements of the law that you need to be aware of.

## Frequently asked training questions

#### Do you have any free places available for the open training programme?

Please reach out if you want to attend any of our training courses, but don't have an organisation funding your place. We sponsor some free training places throughout the year for students and people who are unwaged or using homelessness services.

#### Is there any funding available to offset training costs?

St. Martin in the Fields Frontline Network offer a training fund, £500 for individual training and £1500 for group training. Applications should be in six weeks ahead of the course date. Find out more about the eligibility criteria and how to apply:

#### Do you offer discounts for booking multiple people on a course?

We are happy to discuss booking multiple people on a training course for a discount. Just get in touch with a member of the training team. In some cases, it might be cheaper for non-members to join the network or for organisations to book in-house training.

#### How accessible are your online training courses?

We strive to make our training courses as accessible as possible. You will get a copy of the slides in advance; we schedule frequent screen breaks and there will always be options to use closed captions. We also try to keep jargon to a minimum. Please let us know if there is anything we can do to minimise barriers to participation and we are always happy to hear feedback on where we can improve.

#### Do you deliver hybrid training?

For in-house training commissions we can deliver online, in person or a mix of both depending on what works best for you and your team. When we deliver hybrid training we work with two team members to facilitate all of the conversation spaces so no one is left out.

#### Can we design a bespoke training package?

Absolutely. We can design organisation specific case studies or develop entirely bespoke modules for specific sectors. You can also mix and match the modules that are relevant for your team and their training needs. The best thing to do is to contact us and arrange a chat.
